

# LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Supporters,

HRCS celebrated its 15th Anniversary in 2023 with a new strategic plan. At the heart of that plan is strengthening the connections between the different strands of our organization, tightening the weave of community. Throughout the year we did just that, while bringing new opportunities for learning and growth to all of our constituents.

This work of building connections took many forms, whether it was alumni instructors joining board members for Safety at Sea Workshops, or Shelter Island Yacht Club hosting students for camp and home stays. It included Sail Academy students certifying in NYS Safe Boating alongside adult members. It looked like advanced First Aid courses taken by staff, members, and volunteers together. HRCS attended the Robie Pierce Adaptive Regatta for the first time, and our FairLead sailors hosted Women on the Water, a coalition of female sailors from around the region. Our students were regularly invited to race and learn aboard member boats. HRCS added numerous STEM-related trips and site visits through new partnerships forged through this growing network. HRCS strives to be a catalyst for building new connections and opportunities.

HRCS finished the year on budget, and our balance sheet remains strong. We continue to invest in our talented staff by improving compensation and benefits. We added a member to our Development Team as our philanthropic revenue continues to grow. We made significant capital investments to ensure our fleet is meeting high standards necessary for our challenging environment. Our operations team has created excellent systems for the regular maintenance, upgrades, and replacement of equipment. In 2023

HRCS was able to negotiate much needed additional space in its new permit with the Hudson River Park Trust, and we are moving thoughtfully to activate the space to meet our needs in the years ahead.

Running a youth development program is difficult, especially with the lingering attendance issues schools have seen since the pandemic. HRCS has built a talented and experienced Youth Development team that is intensely committed to the success of each student. They have added activities and opportunities around STEM interest, college access, and family engagement to build student commitment and engagement. They are diligent about reviewing metrics to assure we continue to meet our goals and aspirations.

The Community Programs side continues to grow, improve, and add opportunities as well. New partner organizations joined our Adaptive program, allowing us to serve more participants with spine injuries and visual impairment. In the year ahead we are piloting a membership for Adaptive participants to create pathways to go deeper with sailing skills and community involvement-similar to how Soldiers Under Sail developed.

Our Membership program continues to thrive, with an amazing team that puts learning and inclusion at the center of everything they deliver. We find that culture and tone draws members and volunteers who want to share their knowledge and expertise in an inclusive way. 2023 saw more racing, more mentorship, more social activity, and more days on the water! Thank you to all our members!

Our Public Sailing school continues to see more demand from a diverse and eager constituency. We needed to recruit and train more instructors to meet that demand. We succeeded. Our seasonal instructor team is experienced, skilled, diverse, and provides a positive and supportive learning environment. Public and membership programs play a pivotal role in covering operational costs and allowing us to offer our students meaningful internships and work opportunities.

Our course is not without headwinds. At the end of 2022, HRCS learned at a Community Board 12 meeting that NYC Parks was planning to close Dyckman Marina in 2025. They have broadened the scope of an anticipated waterfront project to include the re-sighting of the Dyckman pier to within the marina area, and to install new docks and pilings as part of the project. HRCS spent much of 2023 trying to clarify and understand the implications of these plans, while also exploring alternatives. After seven years of investment and work building a base and programs there, it is all threatened. We are working hard to find the right path through this murky challenge. What is clear is that HRCS is committed to finding solutions for our members, our students, and our school and adaptive partners who rely on Dyckman Marina. We are doing everything we can to ensure that we can continue the programming we have worked so hard to

## HRCS OVERVIEW

HRCS is a nonprofit organization founded in 2008 with locations in Chelsea and Inwood. We develop leadership and academic success in New York City youth through partnerships with public schools, and our diverse and vibrant community sailing center provides maritime education and recreation to the city at large.

## Sail Academy

Youth Development

Closing the opportunity gap between students from under-resourced schools and their more affluent counterparts by providing high-quality STEM and leadership education, college access support, internships, and workforce preparation.

250 students attend after school at least once per week, in addition to internships and summer programs. HRCS maintains deep and longstanding partnerships with 9 public high schools in Chelsea and 5 public and charter schools in Inwood. Chelsea students can receive elective credit through their schools.

Students sail in the fall and spring. Over the winter, Inwood students begin with simple STEM projects and work their way through wooden boats, birdhouses, and eventually robotics. Chelsea students begin with a maththemed year called Sailing by Numbers, progress through science-themed Ocean Literacy, and finish with First Mates, where they can choose between Elective Tracks including racing, instructing, boatbuilding, and internships. Students get help applying to college and alumni support after graduation.

# Community **Programs**

Public Access

Providing maritime education to thousands of New Yorkers on a fleet of 25 keelboats across both locations. HRCS believes that everyone can learn to sail, and that sailing provides a unique opportunity for growth and discovery. As with Sail Academy, Community Programs foster a sense of stewardship by connecting New Yorkers to their local waters.

Across membership, lessons, summer camp, veterans programs, Adaptive Sailing for New Yorkers of all abilities, and events and regattas for groups and organizations, Community Programs served over 3,000 participants in 2023.

HRCS has a **staff** of 20 full-time employees, 35 seasonal instructors, and 25 interns. Our \$2M budget is half fee-for-service and half philanthropic revenue. This **unique business model** helps to provide stability and flexibility, underwriting the high costs of running a sailing organization.



The two sides of our work tie together--many members volunteer, donate, and mentor youth, and students become interns and instructors, building a unique community dedicated to education and growth.

The sport of sailing has not traditionally been inclusive, and we are dedicated to changing that. Across all of our programs, we are committed to building a welcoming community where everyone learns and grows together.

## SAIL ACADEMY HIGHLIGHTS

### College + Career Prep

Interns and alumni assistants worked 1,083 paid shifts; earning \$74,000 in key part-time income as they enter the workforce.

## Social Emotional Learning + Leadership

HRCS implemented Hello Insight, a tool designed to assess social emotional learning (SEL), across all youth programs. Survey administration remains a challenge, and getting full participation is a goal for the coming year.

Staff piloted quarterly parent newsletter, increased family sails, and held parent town halls to better inform and engage families in their students' program.

## **STEM Identity**

Sail Academy added STEM trips to the Central Park Reservoir, the Thain Family Forest at the New York Botanical Gardens, DURO UAS, and the Hudson River Park's Wet Lab.

94% of students responded yes to the statement "I believe someone like myself can succeed in future opportunities related to science, technology, engineering, or mathematics."



## **Sailing Skills**

Science + Sailing Track learned about the physics behind sailing, experimenting with propulsion, lift, and drag. They tested this knowledge out on the water when the spring semester began.

10 students and alumni took part in the Instructor Development Program, with the goal of becoming HRCS skippers and earning their Basic Keelboat Instructor Certifications. 1 passed, and the rest will continue to train.



# BUILDING COMMUNITY

16 Junior Educators, rising 11th grade Sail Academy students, teach alongside instructors in City Sail Summer Camp.



# COMMUNITY PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHTS

## **Membership**

Membership continued to grow, with 480 members sailing over 6,700 times, an all-time high. New Social Committee planned 8 off-water events.

New Fleet Skipper and Crew Trainer programs increased learning pathways within membership, providing a safe space to learn and fail with staff quidance.


FairLead program for female members had its third season of leadership, mentoring, and social activities. Participants sailed together 680 times. Only 32% of the membership identifies as female, and achieving gender parity remains an important goal.

## **Operations**

With the help of a volunteer member, staff rolled out an electronic **boat checklist** to make data collection and boat maintenance more efficient for both staff and participants.

## **Public Programs**

Developed and codified **new lesson curricula**. **Over 1,100 participants** enrolled in lessons ranging from 3-hour intros to weekend-long certification courses.





**145 volunteers** contributed **over 2,600 hours** across the organization, working in youth programs, event committees, and the boat yards.

Over half of instructional staff were members or Sail Academy alumni. Instructor Development Program for youth and increased training for members helps build staff.

## **ADAPTIVE SAILING**

## HIGHLIGHTS

Expanded to over 200 participants and 9 partner organizations, including VISIONS, our first partner that serves blind and visually impaired New Yorkers.

Adapted additional boats and continued to modify on-board systems, giving participants more flexibility in the roles they can take on the boat.

15 staff, volunteers, and interns participated in 3 training sessions to familiarize them with adaptive equipment and procedures.

**Grants** from the Craig H. Neilsen Foundation, the James B Boskey Memorial Foundation, and the City Parks Foundation help support the growing program.

## HRCS COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

## Rebecca Jimenez

Rebecca Jimenez's journey from a nervous Sail Academy student, wondering if she'd get seasick, to her current role as an Inwood Program Assistant, working with HRCS's middle school partners began at The James Baldwin School for Expeditionary Learning.

"I see myself in [the students]," she reminisces. "I enjoy watching how excited they get, and the fun they have. Seeing them work together - it's something that I can relate to."

As a student at the Outward Bound school, an HRCS partner that serves students behind on credits, who are looking to re-engage in their studies and earn their high school diplomas, Rebecca was "intrigued" by the possibility of earning credit while learning to sail. "I never really thought about sailing being a possibility for public school. I was like, 'you get on sailboats and you get PE and science credits?""

Her first sail in the fall of 2018 felt like "a whole new world." Though she had been on the ferry and kayaking, she had rarely seen the city from the Hudson River. "I was looking at my surroundings a lot and trying to pay attention to the skipper at the same time because we had tasks on the boat, but I found it therapeutic in a way because you have to focus on the direction of the wind, too. That becomes meditative."

In the summer of 2021, following months of Covid school closures and hybrid Sail Academy programming, Rebecca began interning as a City Sail Camp Junior Educator. "Watching the skippers command the boat and engage students, talking them through

maneuvers, it definitely gave me a sense of the type of skipper I would like to be and how I would like to teach certain lessons and engage the students."

That fall, Rebecca was selected as one of two student emcees for HRCS's Sailing for Scholars Gala at the New York Yacht Club. "Speaking in front of a crowd like that is something that is definitely outside of my comfort zone," she remembers. "I was scared doing it, but I was proud of myself at the end because I challenged myself."

Being part of HRCS's biggest annual event sparked an interest in learning more about fundraising and event planning. While considering her post high school plans, Rebecca joined the Development and Communications Department as a part-time Events Assistant. She also took advantage of the Alumni Membership program, continuing her sailing education in the FairLead women's mentorship program. "It's definitely empowering and has given me a space where I feel confident," she said of FairLead. "That space showed me that [making mistakes] is not that big of a deal because at the end of the day, we're all learning and we're all sharing the same passion of wanting to improve our sailing skills."

Now working as a Sail Academy Program Assistant in Inwood and enrolled at Borough of Manhattan Community College, Rebecca is not only sharing what she has learned at HRCS, but also continuing her own growth. "[HRCS] definitely expanded my horizons and made me want to be a better person - not just for myself, but for the Sail Academy students I'm working with."



## HRCS COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

## Rachel Szymanski

Rachel Szymanski discovered her passion for working with individuals with spinal cord injury while studying to become an occupational therapist. A more holistic approach than physical therapy, occupational therapy (OT) focuses on helping people troubleshoot daily tasks, which she refers to as "skills for the job of living." As an occupational therapist at the James J. Peters VA Medical Center in the Bronx, Rachel works with Veterans living with a range of spinal cord injuries and disorders (SCI/D), as well as MS and ALS.

HRCS has been working with the VA since 2011 through an annual clinic called Heroes on the Hudson and Soldiers Under Sail, a program for Veterans that includes instruction, membership, and community building. In 2021, when HRCS launched Adaptive Sailing,

a program designed to give New Yorkers of all abilities access to transformative on-water experiences, the organization reached out to the Bronx VA to be one of its pilot program partners.

Rachel, who "caught the sailing bug" at the National Veterans Summer Sports Clinic in San Diego, jumped at the opportunity to get more involved. As a Washington Heights resident, she knew about HRCS and recalls, "That same evening I signed up for a member orientation! I figured it was now or never!"

In the program's first year, Rachel and fellow therapists supported Community Programs Director Don Rotzien and HRCS staff as the organization developed systems, training, and boat adaptations. HRCS brought the sailing expertise; Rachel and her team brought their experience with Hoyer lifts and transfer techniques. Using go-kart seats and a range of steering adaptations, HRCS built out the J/80s to accommodate participants with different ability levels. "It really is a creative collaboration" Rachel says, emphasizing how much of Adaptive Sailing is a team endeavor: "a lot of it is being receptive to feedback from the Veterans. It's often the little things, like switching from a bulkier life jacket to one that auto inflates, or tying an extra knot on the fly to create a hand hold in the steering line to increase a participant's ability and comfort."

As the program grew, so did Rachel's own sailing experience. She went out with other members on weekends, building skills and connecting them back to her work with the VA. "It was interesting learning all the terminology and having that firsthand experience I could relate to my patients to be able to maximize their experience," she says. It also helps when she recruits new Veterans: "some are absolutely down for anything and everything, others are like 'you want to put me on a sailboat? How is that going to work?' I take the time to explain it to them, and that's where all the sailing

knowledge helps."

"Our Veterans have always felt very supported" she says "the extra effort HRCS has gone through, they really appreciate." Last season, Adaptive Sailing worked with 9 partners and over 200 participants living with a range of disabilities, from SCI/D to visual impairment and developmental disabilities. As the program grows, HRCS plans to add an Adaptive membership to give participants an opportunity to sail within the broader membership.

For Rachel personally, sailing at HRCS has "ignited another passion," as she has shared her experience with HRCS with the broader OT community. Last year, Rachel and her colleague Dukens Pierre presented their work with HRCS to the Academy of Spinal Cord Injury Professionals at their annual conference. With each new season, she continues to enjoy seeing her patients grow, many of whom she has worked with for years. "To be able to see them go from when they were first newly injured, to being out on the water, getting to share that journey with them, it's such an impactful experience, being able to witness that joy."






